A Note From the Pastor

I grew up in a family where my parents not only divorced once, but also remarried each other and divorced again. Did you catch that? Not one divorce, but two. Although I understood the reasons why they divorced, it was a very difficult time for our family. Even when the circumstances are warranted or justified, a split in a home or family unit can be devastating. After living through that experience, my belief has always been that as much as possible, humans need to do all the work they can to grow through our differences, with a focus on trying to find unity.

In the UMC, we are finding ourselves in a current situation which is much like a divorce, where we believe our differences are unresolvable and irreconcilable. Unlike my parent's situation, I feel like the issues that have been raised in the UMC are issues that can be resolved through conversation, prayer, and hard, difficult work. Will it be easy to find common ground for a solution? Not always, but is it worth the struggle? Absolutely. Paul would say that we "should strive to find a more excellent way". He says if we continue to struggle together, then through our work, we can seek a more excellent way- one that we haven't even thought about yet, and isn't one-sided, but it will be God's way to move us forward to be the church that God is calling us to be.

God's way is for us to be one body in him. We especially see this idea through both Jesus' work on earth and in Paul's writings. Paul, in speaking to the Corinthians- who were also going through a time of division over issues they could not agree upon- talks about the importance of unity and being one body, even though there are many unique members. 1 Corinthians 12 tells us that we are connected to one another through Christ and that the body of Christ needs all of the parts to work together. God is looking for a united body, not a uniform body. Paul celebrates and highlights the need for diversity among members to keep a fully functioning body. Paul says we may not all agree, but because we are all connected in the one body through Christ, then no one part can say to another that it isn't important or no longer needed. We need one another to be connected and united in order to keep doing God's work.

Paul's ideas weren't new; he built his ideas of unity upon Jesus' teaching. In John 17:20, Jesus prays during the last supper with the disciples, before he is crucified, that they would all be one with him and with the Father, and that those who come later would all be one within the body. Verse 23 says ".. that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me." Even before he died for us, Jesus was already praying that even those who came later would be united in their faith and belief in him. He sensed even then that our human nature would cause division, and that we would struggle in our faith and with following him.

I am a United Methodist because of my experience with my home church, Highland Park UMC. After the 2nd divorce of my parents, my church was a nurturing, loving, and healing place for me. The church leaders and youth workers focused together to meet my needs and were intentional about sharing God's love with me. It was during that time that I realized the impact that being part of a connectional church can make in someone's life. Through my youth group, I was able to connect with other United Methodist young people while participating in SC Conference youth events, where I had valuable life-forming experiences and met other young people in SC who shared the same United Methodist faith. I still maintain many of those friendships and connections from so long ago, because we have all remained united in the connectional church. It was through the Confirmation process that I first heard my call to youth ministry and later pastoral ministry. Experiencing these conference youth programs and connecting with ministry leaders along the way continued to develop and affirm my call into vocational ministry.

It is through the United Methodist connectional system that I have discovered what a strong impact we can have when we work together rather than apart. In 1995, as a young youth minister, I began to participate in the Salkehatchie Summer Service program, where I spent over 12 years working with other adults and young people to change the lives of many families across SC, who were in extreme need of our physical support and God's love. I have watched young people do things they never knew they could do, such as climbing and repairing a roof, rebuilding bathrooms, using power tools to create safe ramps, all while ministering and showing love to families in extreme need. Other outreach ministries of the United Methodist Church include programs such as the United Methodist Committee On Relief (UMCOR), which is the 2nd largest relief agency behind the American Red Cross in responding to disasters around the world. Epworth Children's Home is another connectional ministry provided to support children whose family situations require them to live in a different location. United Methodist Volunteers In Mission (UMVIM) has trained volunteers to assist around the world in developing countries, helping them to build schools, providing basic needs, and helping them learn how to function better as a society, while also ministering to their people. Apportionments paid from each church in the connectional system support these ministries, which allows our local church to be a part of this world-wide support system, increasing our connection with one another and sharing God's love in a much larger mission field.

Recently, the main focus has been on a few negative actions of certain individuals connected with The United Methodist Church. In reality, the positive effects of the United Methodist Church's presence in the world are much stronger than any negatives that may be discussed. Throughout history, there are footprints of United Methodist support across our historical struggles, especially in advocating for equal rights for all races, women, & children. Based on Wesley's theology of doing all the good we can, in all the ways that we can, for all the people we can, as often as we can, the United Methodist Church will continue to spread God's love to all people.

John Wesley preached God's grace in three forms - prevenient grace is given before we are born; justifying grace is given when we realize we are sinners and in need of God's grace; and sanctifying grace is given when we are moving on to perfection in God's grace. As the United Methodist Church, we will always err on the side of grace for all. As humans, we will have issues, and there will always be room for us to grow through our challenges and our struggles. And struggling is not a bad thing. You may remember my recent sermon focused on Jacob's struggle with God in the wilderness. This wasn't an easy, quick fight; it was long, drawn out, and full of angst. After the struggle, God gave Jacob a new name "Israel", which means he who struggles with God and one another. As God's people, we are called to struggle through the issues we face. Jacob didn't give up; he showed persistence, struggled, and worked through the issues, and because of his faithfulness, he was blessed. We are called to also struggle and work through our issues, and we trust that if we are faithful in the struggle, we, too, will also be blessed.

When the time comes to speak up and let our voices be heard on this issue, it is so important that all members use this privilege to share your faith and trust that God will bless Bethesda through this struggle. 1 Corinthians 16:13-14 tell us, "Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, Be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love." During this time of discernment, I want you to follow's Paul's directions and be courageous in the struggle, willing to share your voice to help Bethesda find the most excellent way to move forward. I will stand firm in my faith as a United Methodist, and I pray that you will be courageous to make your voice heard. God's love is pouring over Bethesda each and every day, and I know he will continue to bless us through this struggle.





The vote will be conducted in accordance with the requirements of the Annual Conference. A list of professing members is posted in the Family Life Center entry way. Finance Committee Letter to the Congregation

We thank you for your generous donations to support our church operating budget. From our operating budget we are able to care for our facilities and support the programs and ministries of our church like youth, VBS and missions outreach.

General offerings are trending down during the Summer months and the church asks that you consider giving to our operating budget. We believe we can achieve our budget goal this year – but it will require everyone's help and commitment to the ministry of Bethesda. Please continue to give faithfully and pray for God to provide for the needs of Bethesda UMC.

There are many ways to give to Bethesda, even if you are away on vacation...

- 1. The Offering Plate on Sunday: Please use an offering envelope and include your name. This aids our counting team and ensures gifts are credited to the right person. If you would like a box of offering envelopes, please call the church office.
- 2. Set up bill pay with your banking provider: A bill pay service may be included as part of a checking account's features. The bank will issue a payment from your account and send it to the church on your behalf.
- 3. **Electronically via Realm**: Online giving can be made by bank account debit (ACH) or via credit card. You can give once or set up automated giving to donate multiple times throughout the year. Realm directions are below.
- 4. Mail in your donation: Bethesda UMC, 516 Piedmont Rd, Easley, SC 29642.
- 5. Donating appreciated securities (such as stocks and bonds) to Bethesda will allow the church and you to avoid capital gains taxes and take a full tax deduction for the value of the securities at the time of donation. Several members already give to the church in this way. This could be a tax-savvy way to support our church budget.
- 6. Give from your IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD): Did you know that if you must take a RMD from your IRA each year, you are allowed to direct the funds to go straight to your church? When you do this, the income NEVER shows up on your tax return at all, and this can benefit you in other areas of your income tax return as well. Consider doing this early in the year, then you can forget it till next year. And keep the money you would normally donate weekly or monthly for your other living expenses. Contact Renita Owens or your tax preparer if you have questions.
- 7. **Planned Giving**: Remembering to include the church in your will is a way to ensure the ministries of Bethesda continue for generations. To learn more about how to include Bethesda in your will, please consult your legal advisor. You should also let the church office know this and make sure the church knows how your gift is intended to be used.
